

Oh, and if you live here and feel like lounging indoors, you'll be able to rent the clubhouse and do just that.



DID YOU KNOW?

A "locavore" is someone who eats locally grown food. Here at Valencia, locally sourced food is a big part of who we are. When food travels shorter distances, we reduce carbon emissions, and local crops are picked when ripe and in their most nutrient-rich state.



The best way to get from here to there? The Eastlink greenway: a network of walking, biking and Neighborhood Electric Vehicle paths that connect to Confluence Park now, and will lead to more parks and open space in the future. There's also a pump track for those who want some two-wheeled fun, a bike repair stand (for those who maybe had a little too much two-wheeled fun), and a shaded pavilion for relaxing or rehydrating. But our homes are about more than floorplans. They're about thoughtful design that embraces big views of the high country. Locations that will get you out into the good stuff, like the planned neighborhood parks and trails. And front porches, rooftop decks and shady patios made for meeting new neighbors and making the most of your outdoor life. And with every new neighborhood, new home designs and styles will come standard. So stay tuned. Because the more choices you have, the better the chances of finding the one that's right for you.







With a name that nods to Southern California's Spanish heritage (and the plentiful orange crops that continue to flourish within the community), Valencia is no stranger to ranching and agriculture.

And the area's rich and storied tradition of land stewardship — one that spans centuries, from the Native Americans to the Gold Rush pioneers — lives on to this day. "Urban agriculture" shows up in ways like small-scale localized farming practices and modern, sustainable food production. And right here in our community, we consider it an important legacy to carry forward.

You'll find it in the Garden Home, a green retreat designed to deepen your relationship with nature — one where residents can take a hands-on class and even borrow garden tools. Or in the community garden, where you can exercise your green thumb by participating in seasonal harvests for everything from heirloom tomatoes to Armenian cucumbers to edible flowers. And we don't do it alone. Farmscape, our local urban farming partner, hosts events and workshops that help our residents enjoy the bounty of the local crops. We even have Farmer Madi, our lead urban gardener, who's here every Tuesday to chat and answer questions about what events are coming and what crops are growing. (We like our information locally sourced, too.)

No matter where you choose to gather, learn and grow, you'll find the opportunity here. We've made sure of it. Because like those who came before us, we're committed to maintaining a healthy connection to the land we're so honored to call home.

LOVABLE LAWNMOWERS

Approximately 500 goats and sheep roaming Valencia's hillsides are a smile-inducing sight, to be sure. But these animals are more than cute. They're also hungry. Which makes them 'sustainable superheroes' of sorts. Since 2019, they've been part of an innovative and environmentally responsible targeted grazing program. The four-legged foragers can eat up to four acres a day — navigating steep terrain and hard-to-access areas to remove dense brush and reduce dry grass and weeds that are potential wildfire fuel. They get all-you-can-eat snacks, and we get to naturally keep portions of our property healthy. (Not too baaaaad.)

Here at Valencia, students don't just have multiple schools at their fingertips, they have multiple school districts. Three of the most highly rated in California, in fact. Which means whether you're looking for public or private, preschool or college prep, kids in K-12 get the tools they need to realize their full potential. There's even a college nearby (but more on that in the sidebar).

HERE ARE THE SPARK NOTES

- Elementary students (K-6) are part of either the Newhall or Saugus Union School District, with a combined total of 25 schools. Kids get the benefit of indoor/outdoor classrooms, an engaged teaching staff, and arts & STEM learning opportunities. There are a number of charter schools and junior kindergartens in the area as well.
- Students attend one of the six middle schools or seven high schools in the William S. Hart School District. The educational opportunities at these schools are incomparable, giving kids the ability to gain skills that will carry them into adulthood — through vocational electives, and specialty programs like the four-year engineering pathway at Saugus High or Valencia High's Medical Science Academy.

Of course, all learn and no play is no fun. Which is why Valencia is a great place for kids to just be kids. With quiet, bike-friendly streets. Trails for roaming and parks for playing. And no shortage of pint-sized pals to explore it all with. You could say it's like recess all day, every day. Maybe even better.

PEP RALLY

Sports are a pretty big deal in the William S. Hart School District. The hard-working athletic teams play everything from football to track & field, and have earned multiple California Interscholastic Federation and state championships. And don't be surprised if you come across a few former district students on Division 1 or professional teams. They're that good.



HI, HIGHER LEARNING

Considering that the majority of high school graduates choose to extend their studies, we're lucky to have fantastic colleges nearby. College of the Canyons is a community college offering degrees in over 200 subjects — and local high school students can get a head start by taking free classes before they've even graduated. And just a mile down the road, the world-class California Institute of the Arts (CalArts) offers undergraduate and graduate degrees in visual art, film, music, theater and more.



At FivePoint Valencia, we are paying diligent attention and taking unprecedented action to conserve natural resources and protect the environment.

At the forefront of our sustainable mission is the permanent preservation of approximately 10,000 acres of funded and managed natural open space (for reference, that's about 7,500 football fields, and about two-thirds of our community's overall size).

Valencia is designed to be one of the nation's first mixed-use communities of its size to achieve net zero emissions of greenhouse gases from its construction and operations. Through a variety of sustainable measures, we're quickly becoming a proof of concept for how to reduce carbon emissions and facilitate healthier living for generations to come. Energy-efficient appliances, windows, lighting and HVAC systems and low-flow kitchen and bathroom fixtures are just a start.

Beyond reducing carbon emissions, the homes at Valencia also help reduce energy costs. New homes are built with photovoltaic solar panels — with some also using electric heat pumps for space heating and cooling, replacing gas-powered A/C condensers. And each home in the first village will come with a level 2 EV charger, making it easy to swap out gas-guzzling cars (and making oil changes a thing of the past).

Conserving natural resources, protecting the environment, reducing the carbon footprint and increasing our quality of life? That's a win-win-win situation.

Included in this pollution-fighting posse is FivePoint Valencia. We routinely participate in the City of Santa Clarita's Annual River Rally Cleanup and Environmental Expo, which gives our residents an opportunity to join us on our environmental stewardship mission.

Valencia is a place born from a simple idea — that neighborhoods should be designed for people first. It's why our plan for the community includes a variety of choices for mobility, from an NEV trail network and pathways for electric bikes and scooters, to mobility hubs, charging stations for electric vehicles, and more.

It's also why we created VALENCIA GOSM— a community-wide, comprehensive transportation organization designed to provide new options and choices for people on the move (and reward them for making sustainable choices). Right now, new FivePoint Valencia homeowners can apply to receive exclusive subsidy reimbursements to put toward the one-time purchase of an eco-friendly mode of transportation.

It's in our nature.

The need to connect to nature is part of the human experience. And no matter how much screen time is required in today's world, our need for green time is just as important. Here in Valencia, the riches of an outdoor life are all around you. With places like Placerita Canyon, Lake Piru, Bouquet Canyon, Castaic Lake, and Angeles National Forest nearby, it's easy to

see why Valencia is a paradise for hikers and mountain bikers alike. And because we feel privileged to be surrounded by all of this majesty, we're doing our part to take care of it. As we develop our community, we are preserving approximately 10,000 acres of land in order to protect local wildlife and habitat—like the endangered spineflower, for starters.



SAVING THE SPINEFLOWER

Call it the little flower that could. The San Fernando Valley spineflower, with its narrow stem and delicate flowers, was once feared extinct. But thanks to an unprecedented partnership with state and federal agencies, this floral underdog has made a comeback and is thriving right here in Valencia — where we're protecting existing populations of the rare plant, and reestablishing it in a suitable habitat.

Why all the fuss? Because native plants that are part of Valencia's rich, natural biodiversity provide nectar for pollinators, shelter for mammals, and food for different forms of wildlife. In other words, for being a small plant, the spineflower is a pretty big deal.




